BHARTI KHER | AT ARNOLFINI AUTUMN 2022

Exhibition dates 22 October 2022 to 29 January 2023

Autumn 2022 at Arnolfini sees internationally renowned artist Bharti Kher return to the South West with a major solo exhibition, including new work, following her successful show at Hauser & Wirth Somerset, 2019 to 2020.

A collector of material and meanings, Kher gathers words and marks, simultaneously filling up the blank pages of sketchbooks and diaries, so that the two interweave within her work. An exploration of her visual language – an often overlooked, yet hugely accessible, aspect of the artist's practice – forms the focus of her exhibition at Arnolfini.

Featuring a body of previously unseen drawings created during her time in Somerset (residencies in 2017 and 2019), Arnolfini's exhibition unfurls the cyclical nature of Kher's work, exploring the notion that her sculptures are born out of the act of drawing. Described as the 'beginnings of a narrative or pointers that mark the way', Kher has also spoken of drawing as a means of 'knowing', an idea that lies at the heart of this exhibition, encouraging audiences to adopt the artist's own curiosity in feeling out narratives amidst the vast array of materials and processes on display.

In addition to the delicate mixed media drawings above, works (drawn from the last 10 years) will also include her highly complex and textured bindi drawings – a material that creates a 'language you know but that you cannot read' – and a new, large-scale, site-specific version of *Virus*; conceived and executed annually as a 30-year on-site project using bindi drawings and text.

Alongside these the artist will present sculptures and installations, interwoven with a rich mix of materials, resonant with cultural and political meaning, such as **Kher's** sari works using resin and the intimate plaster cast portrait series, *Chimera*, in which the artist buries 'the secrets of the soul' under layers of wax and plaster.

Together, these works offer an intimate portal into Kher's world in which drawing, sculpture and installation intertwine, straddling two cultures but speaking one visual language: 'I speak my own hand-brain-body-art language. I hear it, taste it, eat it, write it, draw it.'

The exhibition is accompanied by a publication from Arnolfini, **exploring Kher's** visual language, and interweaving a new collection of intimate words and images. Included within are the **artist's own words** as part of a durational conversation with the curator, alongside newly commissioned writing, and over 60 images, and selected works from across the last ten years.

The exhibition will be open Tuesday to Sunday each week, 11am to 6pm, entry is free and will be bookable in advance via arnolfini.org.uk.

Bharti Kher is represented internationally by Hauser & Wirth, Galerie Perrotin, and Nature Morte (New Delhi, India).

NOTES TO EDITORS

About Bharti Kher

Bharti Kher was born in 1969 in London, UK. She studied painting, graduating in 1991 from Newcastle Polytechnic with a BA Honours, Fine Art, before moving to New Delhi, India, in 1993. Experimentation and alchemy are key to Kher's practice, which explores materiality, religion, secularity, and spirituality, creating new meaning in objects and hybrid narratives that move fluidly between fact and fiction, and certainty and uncertainty. Deeply interested in our experience of an artwork and its relationship to the body, her work often challenges preconceived ideas of gender and femininity, 'tapping into mythologies and the numerous diverse associations a thing or place can bring'.

Kher is recognised within India as a leading contemporary artist with a career spanning over three decades and has developed a well-earned reputation from a multitude of international exhibitions and installations. While less well-known in the UK, where she spends half the year in her London studio, there have been a handful of UK solo exhibitions of Kher's work in the last 20 years, with commercial showings such as *A Wonderful Anarchy*, Hauser & Wirth Somerset, 2019; and gallery and museum presentations: *This Breathing House*, Freud Museum, London; 2017; Parasol Unit Foundation for Contemporary Art, London, 2012; and *Virus*, Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art, 2008. Her work has also been shown in numerous international group exhibitions and is held in public and private collections across the world. Significantly she has been recognised elsewhere by awards such as the prestigious Chevalier dans l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres (Knight of the Order of Arts and Letters),

in France, 2015; the ARKEN Art Prize, Denmark, 2010, and the Sanskriti Awards, India, 2003. She is represented internationally by Hauser & Wirth, Galerie Perrotin (Paris, France) and Nature Morte (New Delhi, India).
